TIPS FOR TRAVELING

Well, the Holidays are over, it's getting colder and some people are starting to think of visiting relatives or leaving Minnesota for a warmer climate for a while. Traveling can be stressful for any traveler, but for us, as ostomates, we need to plan our trips with careful consideration and think about the possible "what ifs". If we pack carefully and know the answers to some of those "what if" questions, our travel will be less stressful and we will be more apt to enjoy those vacations. So here answers to some of those questions we all think about.

• WHAT IF...I am pulled aside for a body search?

First of al, I arrive early enough, at least 20 to 30 minutes more than for the typical security reasons, but if you do have to go through a private search, it's going to take extra time. I got pulled over for the 1st time in 7 years this year. As I went through the scanner it looked like I had an "extra bag" (which I did!) Even though I told security I had an ostomy I still needed to be searched. It took extra time waiting for them to find a female officer to do the search, and then proceed with the pat down. Also, you can carry an Ostomy Card available from the UOAA. www.uoaa.org or 1-800-826-0826. It explains very concisely about an ostomy, requests screening consideration and it does it in a very concise and polite way. *Note: Dar and Anne Marie will be presenting a travel tip program in February with more details and will have some printed cards especially for those of you without computer and Internet capabilities.*

• WHAT IF...I'm questioned about all the medications and/or medical equipment I have with me?

If you have to carry what you think may be considered an inordinate amount of medications ask your doctor for a letter explaining its necessity. For several years I had to travel with a cooler full of IV bags and additional medicines to be injected into them each night, hooked up to a port and pumped into me while I slept. It was quite a hassle but it wasn't going to stop me from traveling. My doctor gave me a letter and "Medical Supplies" stickers to put on the outside of my cooler. When I got to the search area I asked immediately if I could have my cooler searched by hand. I'd hand over the letter and the cooler and was treated kindly by most TSA agents.

• WHAT IF...my pouch fills up with air due to the cabin pressure change on the plane?

This doesn't happen to everyone with an ostomy, but it happens to me. I usually try to wear a larger pouch to accommodate the extra air and I try to sit in the middle seat or the aisle for easier access to the bathroom when I have to "burp or vent" my 2-piece pouch.

• WHAT IF.... I need to change my pouch?

ALWAYS remember to bring extra pouches, clips, wafers etc. in your carry-on. Bring enough to last for several days in case your luggage gets lost. If you 'cut to fit' your wafers, do it ahead of time and leave the scissors in your checked luggage.

• WHAT IF...I'm in a store that has no public restroom and I HAVE to use the employee restroom?

There is a new law, "Ally's Law" or the "Restroom Access Law", which requires retail establishments to allow immediate restroom access to anyone with a medical emergency. This law was created thanks to a young girl named Ally, who has Crohn's Disease. While shopping with her Mom she was denied an urgent need for the bathroom. After pleading with the salesperson and still denied she had a humiliating experience with an accident in the store. This law has been passed in 12 states including Minnesota, Texas, Illinois, Kentucky, Tennessee, Colorado, Ohio, Michigan, Washington, Oregon, Connecticut, and Wisconsin.

• WHAT IF...I need medical care while out of town?


Before you go check your policy. Some insurance companies are much more lenient about paying 'out of coverage area' bills than others so it pays to look up their rules. If you become ill while traveling you may have to have someone call the insurance company to ask for approval before they will pay for your care and there may be different rules for emergency care. I had a terrible time getting a bill paid after treatment for a bowel obstruction in California. My insurance required a call from the emergency room for permission BEFORE receiving treatment. It took many, many months to be paid. However, after the same emergency occurred while visiting my cousins in England, the entire bill was paid, including an ambulance trip and incredibly kind and thorough care given to me. There was a \$50 co-pay and no questions asked.

So basically what we're saying is don't let any of this get in the way of going out to see the world. As our creed says, "...as ostomates we need to be ever mindful of the life which has been given back to us and to find courage to face our daily challenges..."

GETTING TO KNOW ME

In her pleasant, natural way of talking to patients, Julie passed on invaluable tips about dealing with our lives while having an ostomy.

When asked, what does "WOCN" mean, she replied, "Wound, Ostomy and Continence Nurse." You become a CWOCN if you pass all 3 certification tests for the specialty. She started as a WOC consultant when the group was still meeting at the American Cancer building. She has no idea how many years ago she started. Now she is a WOCN

She has been at Fairview Southdale Hospital for 30 years. For the first 14 years she worked as a staff nurse in oncology (2 years) and the rest was spent working on a surgical floor. That was her first experience caring for people with new ostomies. At about the same time, the specialty was gaining popularity across the nation. The hospital was looking for people and she jumped at the chance. It was caring for the ostomate that drew her into the specialty. Julie loves the life connection she has with people. 


